METHODOLOGY



2,206 Ontarians were surveyed between May 17th and May 18th, 2022.



We used the *Lucid Exchange Platform* as the sample provider, which blends a variety of partner panels.



If the survey was a probability-based random sample of the same size, it would be considered accurate to +/- 2.1 nineteen times out of twenty.









Results are sub-regionally weighted for:


- Age, Education and birth sex according to the 2016 Census.
- 2018 Ontario Election Vote.

ONTARIO DECIDED + LEANING

Ford's Ontario PCs lead by nine points province-wide.

Horwath's NDP have lost six points since our last poll.

Del Duca's Liberals have gained three points since our last poll.







GREATER TORONTO AREA DECIDED + LEANING

Ford's PCs lead in two of five GTA regions.

Opposition evenly divided in Central Toronto.

Significant contrast between Suburban Toronto and Central Toronto.




REST OF ONTARIO DECIDED + LEANING

Ford's PCs lead in every region outside of the GTHA.

Liberals in second place in Eastern Ontario.

Significant NDP strength in Southwestern and Northern Ontario.


AGE AND BIRTH SEX DECIDED + LEANING

PCs skew older and male.

Liberals skew older, female.

NDP skew female and younger.

Greens skew younger.








VISIBLE MINORITY / EDUCATION DECIDED + LEANING

Ontario PCs are very consistent among both visible minority status and education.

For the NDP, as education level increases, vote decreases.

For Liberals, as education increases, vote increases.





PARENTS AND NON-PARENTS DECIDED + LEANING

Liberals have strength among fathers, as well as females without children.









DOING THE RIGHT THING

NDP show strength on healthcare, workers, and parents.












PCs have a considerable lead on working professionals.

NDP lead for seniors and students.











STRATEGIC VOTING ANTI-PC

NDP and Green supporters most likely to engage in strategic voting to stop Doug Ford.

- ■I would definitely switch my vote to stop Doug Ford from winning.






STRATEGIC VOTING ANTI-NDP


PC supporters and supporters of other parties are more likely to switch their vote to stop Andrea Horwath from becoming Premier.



GROWING THE PARTIES

Every Party has three groups they need to consider. **Core** - Voters who intend to vote for their party and voted for them in the previous election.

Soft - Voters who intend to vote for their party but voted for a different party in the previous election.


Swing - Voters who do not intend to vote for the party currently but show an openness to switching their vote to that party.

- Swing Voters are the most politically coveted for any party, as they are the most likely to switch and grow the party.

GREATER TORONTO AREA

Ford's PCs have room to grow in Peel Region.

They have already made significant gains in both Peel Region and Suburban Toronto










REST OF ONTARIO

They have already made gains in Northern Ontario.









AGE AND BIRTH SEX

They are more likely to grow among men than women.








VISIBLE MINORITY / EDUCATION

The PCs have grown considerably among visible minorities and those with a high school education or less.








PARENTS AND NON-PARENTS

For Ford's PCs, fathers are a considerable opportunity for growth.









GREATER TORONTO AREA

They have grown considerably in Central Toronto.








REST OF ONTARIO

In Central and Midwestern Ontario, Horwath's NDP have already grown considerably.









AGE AND BIRTH SEX

Horwath's NDP's growth potential is consistent among age/sex breakouts.








VISIBLE MINORITY / EDUCATION

The NDP have an opportunity to grow amongst university-educated people, trade school or college educated people, and visible minorities.




For Horwath's NDP, 32% of fathers and 27% of mothers are swing voters.






GREATER TORONTO AREA

and Durham & York.








REST OF ONTARIO

They have gained significantly in Eastern Ontario.








Liberals have already gained significantly among young females.









VISIBLE MINORITY / EDUCATION

Highest potential for growth for the Liberal party is visible minorities and university educated people.








Overall, Mike


DEBATE PERFORMANCE

Each party leader did about the same with the voters the need to convince to join their party.


Doug Ford fared a bit worse with his swing voters, but still exceptionally positive overall. Q: Thinking about the party leaders,




ISSUE IMPORTANCE

Q: Below is a list of issues facing Ontarians. Please select up to five that you feel are the most important issues facing Ontario.






PC ISSUES



Q: Below is a list of issues facing Ontarians. Please select up to five that you feel are the most important issues facing Ontario.







Q: Currently, Canada's annual inflation rate is 6.7%. From the list below, please select up to five expenses you are most worried about increasing:





Q: From the following list of healthcare priorities, please select up to three you feel the Government of Ontario should prioritize the most:






PC HEALTHCARE





Q: From the following list of healthcare priorities, please select up to three you feel the Government of Ontario should prioritize the most:.





This is especially true among OLP Core supporters.











Across all political groups, a majority believe that protecting the greenbelt must take priority over construction of new highways or housing.

Q: Do you agree or disagree with the following question: Protecting the Greenbelt must take priority over construction of new highways or housing.








Half of Ontarians believe more highways reduces gridlock.

Q: Do you agree or disagree with the following question: Building more highways will reduce gridlock.












Opposition to the 413 highway extension in the GTA comes from Central Toronto.

Halton and Hamilton, the region most directly impacted by the project, is more opposed than in favoured.




